Classroom Expectations:

In this Broadcast Journalism, we work hard. Getting through a full year of work in 18 weeks AND producing the video announcements is not an easy task and we must remain focused. I ask very few things of you when we are together:

Broadcast Journalism:

Broadcast Journalism is responsible for the Wolf Den News, the video announcements that are regularly produced by and for Sierra High School students. Writing announcements and being on camera talent is a requirement. Elements of production and post- production will be utilized here. All projects produced will be broadcast on the Wolf Den New website, as well as uploaded to our YouTube Channel. Students are expected to complete 1-3 hours per week of independent practice such as homework, reading and projects.

Late Work

Late work is not permitted unless explicitly stated. Everyone has the same due dates for assignments and if others can get their work turned in on time, you can too. On a similar note, unless otherwise stated, electronic submissions will not be accepted. Emailing an assignment before class begins with the message "I couldn't print this so here you go" does not count as turning in an assignment. Excused absences are the only way any form of late work is allowed.

Attendance

Attendance will be taken each day. Students are expected to be in class on time and prepared to work. The tardy policy will be strictly enforced. Students not in their seats at the sound of the bell will be marked tardy and placed on a tardy contract from their first offence. Students must get their absences excused from the office in order to have their work they missed be considered for submission. Once an absence is excused, students will have two (2) days to complete the missing work. Late work will not be accepted if absences are unexcused.

Extra Credit

There will be no extra credit assignments offered in this class. There will occasionally be bonus points given on assignments that students will have the opportunity to earn.

Academic Dishonesty and Plagiarism

Academic dishonesty (e.g. lying/cheating/stealing on assignments) will **NOT** be tolerated. Academic dishonesty includes using the ideas or words of others as your own, using previously written papers and submitting them to another instructor, and/or submitting the same paper to two courses without securing approval from both instructors. Any evidence of cheating or plagiarism will result in immediate failure of the assignment, along with a possible referral to the administration.
